EAP is a leading provider of Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA) therapy, which is widely recognized as an effective, evidence-based treatment for autism and is endorsed by the U.S. Surgeon General and American Academy of Pediatrics as the treatment of choice for autism. ABA therapy is covered by many private and government insurance providers.



ABA Services

EAP works closely with parents and educators to develop customized ABA therapy programs, and equips each child's home, clinic and/or school team with the training and supervision necessary for high-quality, consistent teaching and behavioral intervention. Treatment plans are developed and monitored under the direction of a Board Certified Behavioral Analyst (BCBA) or a Board Certified Assistant Behavior Analyst (BCaBA).

EAP's services include initial assessment workshops, three levels of ongoing ABA therapy and supervision and follow-up services. Services are intensive and the schedule and frequency of services is designed to meet each child's individual needs.

About Applied Behavior Analysis

According to Autism Speaks, Applied Behavior Analysis fosters basic skills such as looking, listening and imitating, and complex skills such as reading, conversing and understanding another person's perspective. ABA also helps reduce behaviors that make it difficult for students to learn. Studies indicate that the earlier children receive ABA therapy, the more gains they make.

Home, Clinic and School Services

EAP provides services in clients' homes, in EAP clinics and in schools. Some families prefer home-based services, while others prefer the convenience of clinic-based services and the opportunity they offer their child to interact with other children.

EAP also works with school districts across the country to provide staff training, consulting and ABA programming. When schools work with EAP, school staff members work closely with EAP clinical staff to ensure each child reaches his or her full potential and has the opportunity to be mainstreamed into the traditional learning environment.

Insurance and Funding

Many insurance providers, government providers such as TRICARE for active duty and retired military personnel, Medicaid, and certain companies pay for all or some ABA therapy for children with autism. Some EAP families pay for the services they receive.
